The Membership of the Order shall be limited to men and women who are 18 years of age or older, and are lineal or collateral descendants of those female family members who supported the Confederate Soldiers during the War Between the States. The qualifying female ancestors shall be limited to mothers, sisters, wives, daughters, aunts, sweethearts, and fiancés of qualifying direct or collateral Confederate Soldiers of the applicant.

Only Life Membership shall be offered. A person shall be deemed to be a life member upon approval of his/her application to the Order on its official lineage form and the payment of all fees and dues.

The current Order of the Steel Magnolias application must be completed by all applicants. Names, dates and places of birth, marriage and death must be given in each generation, as far as known, and sufficiently to prove the line. Each generation must be adequately connected to the preceding generation, consistent with standard professional genealogical practices. All sources relied on to prove the lineage must be cited and copies furnished.

Copies Military Service Records of the Confederate Soldier are required to prove service. If an application cannot be accepted, the Life Membership fee shall be refunded, less twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), which shall be retained for examination services.



OSM Official Insignia

The official insignia of the Order was based on an actual magnolia bloom and leaves in Georgia and will be rendered as follows:

Top Bar

Top bar is approximately .69 x 1.5". Embellishment includes a top ribbon flanked by magnolia leaves with beaded trim around the remaining three sides. "Order of the Steel Magnolias" appears in green enamel under the ribbon and leaves. There is a hidden ribbon bar on the back to attach the official green and ivory moiré ribbon.

Founding Member Pin

The Founding Member pin measures approximately $.35 \ge 1.25$ " with coordinating beaded trim to match the top bar. "Founding Member" appears in green enamel centered on the pin.

Charter Member Pin

The Charter Member pin measures approximately $.35 \times 1.25$ " with coordinating beaded trim to match the top bar. "Charter Member" appears in green enamel centered on the pin.

Officer Pin

The Officer pin measures approximately .81 x 1.13". The 10 different offices each appear in green enamel in the center of the decorative repousse edge. The years of service will be engraved under the office title.

Ancestor Bar

The Ancestor Bar measures approximately .25 x 1.37". The ancestor name will be engraved on the bar.

Lower Insignia

The lower insignia consisting of a magnolia bloom and leaves measures approximately 1.13×1.5 " and will dangle from the official ribbon.

Miniature Insignia

The miniature insignia will be a miniature silver magnolia in the appropriate size to wear on the branch bar with the miniature insignia of other societies.

The ribbon of the Order is dark green with a trim of cream.

The miniature insigne of the Order may be worn at any time. If worn together with other miniature insignia, it will be placed in the order of its founding in relation to the founding dates of other societies.

The President's Regalia shall be in sterling silver and will be a single enlarged magnolia bloom and leaves suspended from a bow and embellished with stones.

Women of the Confederacy Medal





This is a circa 1924 Southland Memorial Association Women of the Confederacy medal.

Little is known about this unique medal. It measures 1.5" x 2.5".

The Southland Memorial Association, a sponsored organization under the auspices of the United Confederate Veterans, the Sons of Confederate Veterans and the United Daughters of the Confederacy®, was organized at Fort Worth in 1924, to create a "Southland Institute of Learning" or sometimes referred to as "Great Southland Institute of Learning" in memory of the women of the Confederacy. Mr. S.O. Moodie, Houston, Texas, was head of the Association.

The top bar reads, "In Memoriam" which is a Latin phrase meaning "in memory of" or "as a memorial to."

There is a female image with a wreath of vines or twigs in her hair

On the scroll below the image is: W of C (Women of Confederacy)

Around the Second Confederate Navy Jack flag which is turned in a cross like position it reads:

"Southland Mem. Association 1861 1865". There is no makers mark on the back.

Most Ladies' Memorial Associations and the United Daughters of the Confederacy® used the First National Confederate flag so it is assumed the medal was designed by the Confederate Veterans.

Unfortunately, the newspaper articles end in 1931. If you know anything about what happened to the plans for the college or the medal please email us so we can print a follow up.

"College Honoring Confederate Women Is Planned In The South"

Governor McLean Is Invited by Texas Man to Join in Movement Designed to Erect Great School as Memorial to Women of the Confederacy

Raleigh April 28— The creation of a great Southland institute of learning in memory of the women of the Confederacy is the announced object of the Southland Memorial Association organized in 1924 under the auspices of the United Confederate Veterans, the Sons of Confederate Veterans and the United Daughters of the Confederacy according to a letter received by Governor A.W. McLean from S.O. Moodie of Houston, Texas, first vice-president of the association.

Invitation Is extended to Governor McLean, and doubtless to Governors of other Southern States, suggesting that the occasion of the annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans at Little Rock, Arkansas, May 8-10, will be an opportune time for the chief executives of these States to get together, in response to an invitation by the Legislature of Florida, and take united action in support of the Southern Memorial Association in its efforts to have the South leave to our posterity evidence of its appreciation, love, respect and gratitude to the "Women of the Confederacy" for the sacrificial service rendered by them in the days that tried men's souls from 1861 to 1865, inclusive.

The United Confederate veterans have indorsed the proposal four times, the Sons of Confederate Veterans twice, and the United Daughters of the Confederacy once, the letter states, adding Individual indorcers, as well as the statement that a majority of the Governors have indicated their approval, and in several instances appointed men to serve on a committee to devise ways and means for carrying out the purposes of the association."

The invitation to the Governors has the approval of the general chairman of the reunion committee, it is stated, Mr. Moodie extended the invitation to them for the meeting.


Silver Certificate for Donor to School

Certificate No. 1 of the Southland Memorial association, sponsored by the United Confederate Veterans and the Sons and Daughters of the Confederacy, will be awarded to the person who makes the most satisfactory donation to a fund for the erection of a proposed school to commemorate the women of the Confederacy, according to information received here from J. C. Foster, commander of the Texas division of the U. C. V. Sealed bids are to be sent to Gen. Lon A. Smith of Austin, Texas, by November 21.

The movement was inaugurated at the last convention of the U. C. V. at Memphis and is being put into action by the Texas department.

In regard to the work of the Southland Memorial Association, it has for its purpose the creation of a Great Southern Memorial Institute as a memorial to the "Women of the Confederacy". I wish to say that following our meeting at Birmingham, I visited Muscle Shoals, Alabama, and the three adjacent cities of Florence, Sheffield and Tuscumbin, and while at Florence, at the initiative of the Chamber of Commerce, addressed that body on the subject of the purpose of our Association, and the Chamber of Commerce promptly voted to tender a site for the great Southland Memorial Institute if we would locate within two miles of Muscle Shoals.

So, now being assured of a free site, with more than \$100,000 there's nothing left for us to do but to raise the funds to create the only and the greatest tribute of love and respect ever left to womankind—the most patriotic, loving and self-sacrificing galaxy of womanhood—the "Women of the Confederacq". S. O. MOODIE, Vice President, Southland Memorial Association.

Veterans Plan New University for Southland

San Angelo, Texas, Oct. 9 (P).—The establishment of a university in the south with an endowment of \$5,000,-000 is the aim of a group of Confederate veterans, led by S. O. Moodie of Houston, a vice president of the Southland Memorial association.

The endowment, is to come from the \$50,000,000 fund now held in the court of claims as a result of the decision of the United States federal court of claims which declared that the special cotton tax enacted after the Civil war indirectly made the south pay the cost of the war.

Eleven southern governors have endorsed the plan and a number of congressmen and senators have agreed to sponsor it, Mr. Moodie said. The Texas division of United Confederate veterans at their meeting here Saturday endorsed the plan.

MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION BEEN ORGANIZED

CONFEDERATE WOMEN

AUSTIN, Nov. 22. — A Texas branch of the Southland Memorial Association has been organized here with the election of General J. M. Cochran of Dallas as president and Mrs. Joe Wroe of Austin as secretary. The association plans for the erection of a college in the South as a memorial to the women of the Confederacy.

College Is Planned. A resolution passed by the vet-

erans calls upon their comrades and friends to contribute to the fund, "to consecrate it forever to the women of our Southern Confederacy."

Another recognition for the women of the Confederacy was a decision to place on the executive board of the Southland Memorial Association a Confederate veteran from each Southern State. The association plans to build a memorial college to Southern women.

Catherine Parkinson, Warrington, Va., was chosen the most beautiful member of any sponsorial staff of Sons of Veterans in Dallas, and presented with a silk banner from the Texas Division.

The convention rejected almost unanimously a proposal to discontinue the annual reunions and to hold departmental meetings instead. The veterans declared their desire to hold the general reunions as long as "two are left." They then selected Birmingham, Ala., as the 1926 reunion city.

The veterans adopted a hands-off policy with reference to the Stone Mountain Memorial controversy, defeating a resolution asking for representation on the executive board of the memorial association.

MEMORIAL URGED FOR CONFEDERATE WOMEN

Support of efforts to establish a Southland memorial to women of the Confederacy is asked in a letter sent to all members of the Southland Memorial Association by S. O. Moodie, Houston, vice president of the organization.

The letter states that the Legislature of Florida last year passed resolutions calling on all Southern States to take co-operative action in support of the association, which desires to create a "Southland Institute of Learning" in memory of the women of the Confederacy.

Rachel Price Bass

Rachel Price was born 30 April 1832 in Mecklenburg Co., NC, to parents Burrell Price and Rebecca Tomberlin Price. She was married to Uriah Bass in 1839 in Barbour Co., AL. By the time the War Between the States broke out, she and Uriah had six children. They farmed on land purchased by the Bass family near Hagler's Mill outside of Louisville, AL. Uriah enlisted in Co. B of the 39th AL Inf. Not only did Uriah join the Southern Cause, but so did Rachel's father and four brothers. When Uriah left home, Rachel was alone to provide for herself and her children-without the aid of any man in her family. Her oldest son was ten, and her youngest child, a girl, was not a year old. Uriah had only been gone for about six months when his unit was assigned to guard the pass in Chattanooga, TN. In the dead of a harsh winter on December 13, 1862, Uriah died from disease and was buried in a mass unmarked grave near the hospital camp.

Because three of Rachel's brothers were also in Co. B of the 39th AL Inf, she found out about his death. However, a family story tells a different tale of how she knew he would not return to her. According to the story, on the day he went away to serve the Confederacy, Uriah left his cherished fiddle at home under the

bed. The lore says that on December 13th Rachel heard a sound coming from beneath the bed, and she looked to see the strings of the fiddle moving on their own to a strain she had often heard Uriah play. Her heart broke, for she knew he would never return to her.

Throughout her life, Rachel was a devoted mother who labored for the welfare of her children. The Scripture says, "A woman's children will rise up and call her blessed." No greater testimony can there be to such a woman than in the twilight of her years, she lived with her children. They cared for her just as she had done for them. She is buried between three of her children in the Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church cemetery in Dale County, AL.
