This officer attended Marie Sanford's funeral with OSM Secretary General Sue Southern and Founding Member Loretta Martin.

The Executive Board voted to make a \$150 donation to Tunnels to Towers in honor of General Officer Bob Odom. This was the organization of his choice. The organization received a lovely thank you card from his wife and Co-Founder Carla Whitehurst Odom. During my first year as president, we lost Charter Member and Historian General Felicia C. Wilt. 2023 Meeting Minutes

Approved by Committee: Melissa Fischer and Teresa Roane

President Leslie Kirk called the meeting to order at 12:49 pm and advised that next year Steel Magnolias will go first with extra time. She welcomed the assembly.

She Married a Family of a Dozen Ancestor Spotlight Leslie Kirk



At 20 years old, Sarah Ellen Freeman, the daughter of William Ely Freeman, a Confederate soldier, became the bride of another soldier, William David Missildine, on July 26, 1871. In addition to gaining a husband, she became the stepmother of 11 children from Missildine's first marriage to Annie Jane Soles who, unsurprisingly died in 1870 from complications from childbirth. Four of those stepchildren were under the age of five at the time of her marriage. Over the course of her marriage, Sarah Ellen Freeman had 12 children of her own bringing the total number of children to 23! Later in life, she suffered from blindness which was detailed in her widow's pension medical records. This blindness was later attributed to a rare eye disease Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP), a hereditary disease, passed down through the family. Despite her blindness, Sarah was admired for her ability to recognize all her 150 descendants simply by the sound of their voice.



Sarah and William Missildine's first daughter was Emma Victoria Missildine (Dorman). She was a Steel Magnolia daughter, granddaughter, niece, and daughter-in-law. This daughter could recall being rushed into the cellar when Federal Troops came around on horseback. She heard men try to steal from community members as well as beat those unwilling to part with their money. Crops and livestock were stolen; barns burned, and she knew of men in the community having secret meetings to plan for survival. Emma's father and grandfather had both been in military hospitals and held captive as prisoners of war. Stories of disease, injury, death, and destruction were the most terrifying. Traveling by foot, it wasn't uncommon to find bodies or body parts littered along their path. They watched as family members and friends died before their eyes on the battlefield. Granny Emma's father-in-law and my third great grandfather, John Zachariah Dorman, Sr., a very skilled sharp shooter, had his right arm intentionally shot off at Chickamauga. Year later, Granny Emma recalled the sharp pain of the family's inability to care for her grandfather

Freeman and father-in-law Dorman, who suffered from PTSD. Nightmares ruled their minds as they grew old, unmanageable, and combative resulting in their deaths in the only state mental hospital, Bryce in Tuscaloosa.

This second great grandmother, Granny Emma, died when Mary Lucille Dorman (Newman), my grandmother, was 32 years old. My grandmother Mary remembered the firsthand stories of war and reconstruction vividly.

These ancestors were part of the rural community Pisgah in Montgomery County between Montgomery and Troy, Alabama. Many of these families arrived prior to Alabama's statehood in 1819, setting up homesteads in nothing but wilderness and truly Indian Territory. Much of their progress - communities and federal roads - are still in use today.

The Pisgah Community of Grady, Alabama, in Montgomery County was home to the Pisgah Primitive Baptist Church Cemetery, the burial site of my maternal relatives for 200 years including my mother, Jane Newman (Kirk). A portrait of Minister Robert Francis Missildine, my fourth great grandfather, hangs inside this historically marked white church built on a hill with a rolling landscape complete with a foot washing pool. My great grandfather, Thomas Jefferson Dorman, was paid \$1 a day during the Depression to transport huge stones from Troy, Alabama, to Pisgah with a horse and wagon. These stones surround the cemetery today.

Visitors to Alabama include the Pisgah community on their itinerary for Red's Little School House Restaurant featured on "Alabama's 100 Dishes to Eat Before You Die" for years. The fried cornbread is a must to try!

The Membership of the Order shall be limited to men and women who are 18 years of age or older, and are lineal or collateral descendants of those female family members who supported the Confederate Soldiers during the War Between the States. The qualifying female ancestors shall be limited to mothers, sisters, wives, daughters, aunts, sweethearts, and fiancés of qualifying direct or collateral Confederate Soldiers of the applicant.

Only Life Membership shall be offered. A person shall be deemed to be a life member upon approval of his/her application to the Order on its official lineage form and the payment of all fees and dues.

The current Order of the Steel Magnolias application must be completed by all applicants. Names, dates and places of birth, marriage and death must be given in each generation, as far as known, and sufficiently to prove the line. Each generation must be adequately connected to the preceding generation, consistent with standard professional genealogical practices. All sources relied on to prove the lineage must be cited and copies furnished.

Copies Military Service Records of the Confederate Soldier are required to prove service. If an application cannot be accepted, the Life Membership fee shall be refunded, less twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), which shall be retained for examination services.



OSM Official Insignia

The official insignia of the Order was based on an actual magnolia bloom and leaves in Georgia and will be rendered as follows:

Top Bar

Top bar is approximately .69 x 1.5". Embellishment includes a top ribbon flanked by magnolia leaves with beaded trim around the remaining three sides. "Order of the Steel Magnolias" appears in green enamel under the ribbon and leaves. There is a hidden ribbon bar on the back to attach the official green and ivory moiré ribbon.

Founding Member Pin

The Founding Member pin measures approximately .35 x 1.25" with coordinating beaded trim to match the top bar. "Founding Member" appears in green enamel centered on the pin.

Charter Member Pin

The Charter Member pin measures approximately .35 x 1.25" with coordinating beaded trim to match the top bar. "Charter Member" appears in green enamel centered on the pin.

Officer Pin

The Officer pin measures approximately .81 x 1.13". The 10 different offices each appear in green enamel in the center of the decorative repousse edge. The years of service will be engraved under the office title.

Ancestor Bar

The Ancestor Bar measures approximately .25 x 1.37". The ancestor name will be engraved on the bar.

Lower Insignia

The lower insignia consisting of a magnolia bloom and leaves measures approximately 1.13 x 1.5" and will dangle from the official ribbon.

Miniature Insignia

The miniature insignia will be a miniature silver magnolia in the appropriate size to wear on the branch bar with the miniature insignia of other societies.

The ribbon of the Order is dark green with a trim of cream.

The miniature insigne of the Order may be worn at any time. If worn together with other miniature insignia, it will be placed in the order of its founding in relation to the founding dates of other societies.

The President's Regalia shall be in sterling silver and will be a single enlarged magnolia bloom and leaves suspended from a bow and embellished with stones.

Phoebe Yates Levy Pember August 18, 1823 - March 4, 1913 Chief Matron of Chimborazo Hospital Richmond, Virginia



Phoebe Yates Levy Pember was born on August 18, 1823. She was the fourth of six daughters of a prosperous and socially prominent Jewish family in Charleston, South Carolina. Her father was a successful merchant and her mother was a popular actress.

Members of Phoebe's family were quite active in public life during the war. Her sister Eugenia Levy Phillips, a Confederate spy, was banished to an island. Her brother Samuel was the highest ranking Jewish officer in Savannah, Georgia.

The family's wealth enabled them to gain acceptance in the community, which wasn't easy for Jews. They moved among Charleston's elite until a series of

financial setbacks sent them to Savannah, Georgia, in 1850.

Phoebe was then 27 years old and wanted a life of her own. She married Thomas Pember, a non-Jew, in Boston, Massachusetts, in 1856. Soon after the wedding, Thomas contracted tuberculosis, and the couple moved to the South, hoping his health would improve there.

On July 9, 1861, Thomas died of tuberculosis in Aiken, South Carolina. He was 36 years old. Widowed and childless, Phoebe returned to her family, who had fled to Marietta, Georgia, to escape the ravages of war.

In November 1862, Mrs. George Randolph, wife of the Confederate Secretary of War, offered Phoebe a position as a matron at the Chimborazo Hospital, a Confederate military hospital outside of Richmond, Virginia. Though Phoebe had no professional medical training, she believed that caring for her husband through years of illness qualified her for hospital work.

Chimborazo was said to be the largest military hospital in the world at that time. A complex of long, one-story whitewashed buildings sprawled atop a hill, the hospital began receiving patients in 1862 and was eventually expanded to 150 wards.

Each ward was a separate building, thirty feet wide and one hundred feet long, and housed approximately forty to sixty patients. Phoebe supervised 150 wards, and an estimated 15,000 soldiers were under her care during the Civil War.

On December 1, 1862, 39-year-old Phoebe Yates Pember became the chief matron of the Second Division at Chimborazo, which was one of five divisions in the hospital. Though she was confident in her abilities, she encountered much opposition, but she was not one to be pushed around.

In response to criticism that ladies should not see the horrors of a hospital, Phoebe replied:

"In one instance, Pember threatened a would-be thief with a gun she kept hidden in order to keep him away from the barrels of whiskey."

"In the midst of suffering and death, hoping with those almost beyond hope in this world; praying by the bedside of the lonely and heart stricken; closing the eyes of the boys hardly old enough to realize man's sorrows, much less suffer man's fierce hate, a woman must soar beyond the conventional modesty considered correct under different circumstances." Though plagued by shortages of medicine and supplies, and having to contend with doctors who didn't approve of female nurses, Phoebe cared for sick and wounded Confederate soldiers for the balance of the war.

But her position seemed little more than that of a cook, until the surgeon-in-charge, Dr. James McCaw, found her peeling potatoes one day.

McCaw made a thorough study of hospital rules and organized a full staff under Phoebe's jurisdiction. She was provided with an assistant matron, cooks and bakers, and two laborers to perform menial tasks.

She also made sure that the orders of surgeons were performed properly, and that the medical and dietary needs of her patients were fulfilled. She wrote letters for the soldiers and comforted the dying, and set a pattern of compassionate care for the terminally ill that served as a model for future generations of nurses.

She eventually found some respite from her duties by renting a room in town, to which she returned at night. Meanwhile, her patients taught her something about courage:

"No words can do justice to the uncomplaining nature of the Southern soldier. Day after day, whether lying wasted by disease or burning up with fever, torn with wounds or sinking from debility, a groan was seldom heard."

As the war progressed, casualties multiplied and Phoebe's duties increased. Large numbers of incoming wounded caused shortages of medical supplies, surgeons and assistants, and hospital beds. She arranged for makeshift beds and continually washed and dressed minor wounds, preparing the more difficult cases for the surgeons.

Phoebe wrote in her memoir about Richmond:

"The horrors that attended, in other and past times, the bombardment of a city, were experienced to a great degree in Richmond during the fighting around us. The close proximity to the scenes of strife; the din of battle, the bursting of shells, the fresh wounds of the men hourly brought in, were daily occurrences.

Walking home after the duties of the Hospital were over, often when evening had well set in, during this time, the pavement around the railroad depot would be lined with wounded men, laid there to wait for ambulances to take them to the receiving hospital; some on stretchers, others on the bare bricks, or a thin blanket, suffering from wounds hastily wrapped around with the coarse, galling, unbleached homespun bandages, in which the blood had stiffened till every crease cut like a knife.

Women, passing like myself, would put down their basket or bundle, and ringing at the bell of any neighboring house, ask for basin and soap, and a few soft rags, and going from one sufferer to another, alleviate, with what skill they had the pain of wounds, change the uneasy position and allay the thirst. Many passing, would stop and look on, till the labor appearing to require no particular skill, they too would follow the example set them, and asking occasionally a word of advice, do their part carefully and willingly.

Idle boys passing, would get a pine knot, or tallow candle, and stand quietly as torch bearers, till the scene,

with its gathering accessories, formed a strange picture, not easily forgotten. Persons passing in vehicles would sometimes alight, and, choosing the patients most in want of surgical aid, put them in and send them to the Seabrook Hospital, continuing their way on foot. There was very little conversation carried on, no necessity for introductions, and no names ever asked."

Phoebe remained at Chimborazo until the Confederate surrender in April, 1865. She stayed with her patients after the fall of Richmond and until the facility was taken over by Federal authorities. During that time, she cared for both Confederate and Union soldiers. A total of 76,000 patients had been cared for at Chimborazo by the end of the Civil War.

She suddenly found herself alone in Union-occupied Richmond, without prospects, and with just a silver 10-cent piece and a box of useless Confederate money to her name. Laughing at her lot, she spent her paltry remaining funds on "a box of matches and five cocoa-nut cakes."

In 1995, her portrait appeared on a sheet of 20 stamps issued by the United States Postal Service, which commemorated important persons and events during the Civil War.

When her responsibilities in Richmond were completed, Phoebe returned to Savannah, Georgia. There, she maintained her elite social status, and traveled extensively in the United States and Europe. She was honored by Confederate veterans' organizations during her later years.

Phoebe also wrote her memoirs, A Southern Woman's Story: Life in Confederate Richmond. First published in 1879, it is rated by Civil War historian Douglas Southall Freeman as "the most realistic treatment of the war" ever published.


Phoebe Yates Pember died on March 4, 1913, at the age of 89, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She was buried in Laurel Grove Cemetery in Savannah. An obelisk was later erected there in her memory.

Inspirational Page Teamwork ~ Stand by Each Other

When you see geese flying along in "V" formation, you might consider what science has discovered as to why they fly that way. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone — and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front. If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those people who are headed the same way we are.

When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point. It is sensible to take turns doing demanding jobs, whether with people or with geese flying south. Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

What messages do we send when we honk from behind? Finally — and this is important — when a goose gets sick or is wounded by gunshot, and falls out of formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly or until it dies, and only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation to catch up with their group.

If we have the sense of a goose, we will stand by each other in teamwork!
